Attached is an overview of the progress of the Task Group World Heritage since last WSB and other World Heritage activities and projects carried out in the framework of the TWSC work plan.

The main focus of TG-WH was the preparation of the SIMP implementation strategy (see separate document WSB 41/5.1/3), reporting to the World Heritage Centre according to the Operational Guidelines §§ 172 and 174, and the 3<sup>rd</sup> cycle of Periodic Reporting.

Since WSB 40, TG-WH had two online meetings on 23 February and 23 March 2023 The next regular meeting is scheduled on 7-8 June 2023.

Proposal: The meeting is referred to the proposals in the document.





### Progress Report Talk Group Wadden Sea World Heritage

### 1. State of Conservation reporting to UNESCO World Heritage Centre

TG-WH has the task to coordinate the reporting of the States Parties to the UNESCO World Heritage Centre in order to underline that the Wadden Sea World Heritage is managed as one property.

According to the Operational Guidelines (OG) of the World Heritage Convention, these reports can be distinguished into state party information (OG § 172) and reports upon request by the World Heritage Centre, which has received third party information on specific issues and requests information/clarification from States Parties (OG § 174).

An overview on state party information and of responses on requests from the World Heritage Centre until April 2023 is provided in Annex 1.

TG-WH also discussed how to provide guidance for a common understanding of all three States Parties regarding the reporting according to OG 172 (state party information). This mainly concerns the selection of projects or project types that have a potential impact on the OUV and therefore need to be reported to the World Heritage Centre. The aim is to develop a trilateral guidance which supports the States Parties regarding OG 172 reporting but does not preclude any additional reporting if a State Party deems it necessary.

## 2. Wadden Sea State of Conservation Report – Requests from the UNESCO WH Centre and 45th Session of the World Heritage Committee

With letter of 19 December 2022, the World Heritage Center asked for further information in preparing a State of Conservation Report (SoC) concerning the Wadden Sea to be submitted to the 45<sup>th</sup> session of the World Heritage Committee.

The SoC report for consideration by the WH Committee (including a draft decision on the State of Conservation) will only be published six weeks before the start of the 45th session World Heritage Committee meeting which will take place in Riyadh (Saudi Arabia) on 10 -25 September 2023. Therefore, a TG-WH meeting will be scheduled in beginning of August for a coordinated response.

TG-WH also suggested to submit the SIMP to the World Heritage Centre in due time so it can be considered in preparing the State of Conservation Report for the upcoming World Heritage Committee meeting.

TG-WH has already discussed scenarios regarding a potential WHC draft decision paper on the State of Conservation and proposed some ways to strategically work with these to WSB 38 (October 2022) (see document WSB 38/5.1/1) which was approved by WSB.

Options for a draft decision are (in the order of "strictness"):

- a) Proposal to list the Wadden Sea on the WH List of danger (unlikely, but still on option).
- b) Decision to list the Wadden Sea on the WH List of danger in case that specific requests of the Committee are not implemented.
- c) not a) and b) but the request to prohibit any mineral extraction,
- d) any other requests (as we have already received, such as alien species, flyways, tourism, the SIMP); might be combined with a-c.

In addition, the State of Conservation might be proposed for discussion by the World Heritage Committee or for adoption without discussion.

### Way to deal with this:

- 1. Analyse the draft decision after it has been published.
- 2. Check if the draft decision and the information in the document are factually correct.
- 3. Discuss in TG-WH if and how we might need to "lobby" for changes. In case the SOC report is proposed for "adoption without" discussion this means that a WH Committee member will have to ask for the opening of this SOC and would need a very consistent argumentation.
- 4. Start right now to organise the "lobby" work in a strategic way via their Permanent Representations in Paris asap while ensuring that states act jointly and in a coordinated manner.

### PROPOSAL:

- 1. Support the proposal on how to deal with the outstanding SoC and instruct CWSS to make a first factual check of the draft decision paper as soon it is publicly available which is at least by 31 July 2022.
- 2. Instruct TG-WH to assess the draft decision paper until mid of August to prepare guidance how to jointly react on the SoC and draft decision.

### 3. Third Cycle of Periodic Reporting

The 3rd cycle of the Periodic Reporting started for Europe and North America (2018 – 2024). For the Wadden Sea, the online questionnaire was opened in September 2022. It is the second time (after 2014) to submit such a report for the Wadden Sea.

Periodic Reporting is a self-reporting process to give information on the legislative and administrative provisions which states parties have adopted and other action which have been taken for the application of World Heritage Convention with the aim of providing overall assessment for all sites.

Periodic reporting is a statutory of the convention independent from the State of Conservation Report (reactive monitoring). Therefore, there is no procedure for site specific individual following-up the answers provided in the periodic report. The WH Centre will provide an overall analysis for the whole Region (Europe/North America).

CWSS has been designated by the States Parties as the World Heritage site manager responsible to fill in the questionnaire section II for the World Heritage property in the framework of the Third

Cycle of the Periodic Reporting. Germany will act as National Focal Point to submit the Periodic Reporting on behalf of the three States Parties, Denmark, Germany and the Netherlands.

The online questionnaire has been completed by TG-WH (see Annex 2) on the basis of the available information and considering the 2<sup>nd</sup> cycle periodic reporting (2014) as well as the nomination dossiers submitted to the World Heritage Centre and forwarded to the German National Focal Point.

The online report will be submitted electronically by German National Focal in the coming weeks.

- 3. Statement of Outstanding Universal Value
- 3.1 Statement of Outstanding Universal Value for the property as adopted by the World Heritage Committee

### Statement of Outstanding Universal Value Brief synthesis

The Wadden Sea is the largest unbroken system of intertidal sand and mud flats in the world, with natural processes undisturbed throughout most of the area. The 1,143,403 ha World Heritage property encompasses a multitude of transitional zones between land, the sea and freshwater environment, and is rich in species specially adapted to the demanding environmental conditions. It is considered one of the most important areas for migratory birds in the world, and

Wadden Sea

is connected to a network of other key sites for migratory birds. Its importance is not only in the context of the East Atlantic Flyway but also in the critical role it plays in the conservation of African-Eurasian migratory waterbirds. In the Wadden Sea up to 6.1 million birds can be present at the same time, and an average of 10-12 million pass through it each year.

Criterion (viii): The Wadden Sea is a depositional coastline of unparalleled scale and diversity. It is distinctive in being almost entirely a tidal flat and barrier system with only minor river influences, and an outstanding example of the large-scale development of an intricate and complex temperate-climate sandy barrier coast under conditions of rising sealevel. Highly dynamic natural processes are uninterrupted across the vast majority of the property, creating a variety of different barrier islands, channels, flats, gullies, saltmarshes and other coastal and sedimentary features.

Criterion (ix): The Wadden Sea includes some of the last remaining natural large-scale intertidal ecosystems where natural processes continue to function largely undisturbed. Its geological and geomorphologic features are closely entwined with biophysical processes and provide an invaluable record of the ongoing dynamic adaptation of coastal environments to global change. There are a multitude of transitional zones between land, sea and freshwater that are the basis for the species richness of the property. The productivity of biomass in the Wadden Sea is one of the highest in the world, most significantly demonstrated in the numbers of fish, shellfish and birds supported by the property. The property is a key site for migratory birds and its ecosystems sustain wildlife populations well beyond its borders.

Criterion (x): Coastal wetlands are not always the richest sites in relation to faunal diversity; however this is not the case for the Wadden Sea. The salt marshes host around 2,300 species of flora and fauna, and the marine and brackish areas a further 2,700 species, and 30 species of breeding birds. The clearest indicator of the importance of the property is the support it provides to migratory birds as a staging, moulting and wintering area. Up to 6.1 million birds can be present at the same time, and an average of 10-12 million each year pass through the property. The availability of food and a low level of disturbance are essential factors that contribute to the key role of the property in supporting the survival of migratory species. The property is the essential stopover that enables the functioning of the East Atlantic and African-Eurasian migratory flyways. Biodiversity on a worldwide scale is reliant on the Wadden Sea.

### Integrity

The boundaries of the extended property include all of the habitat types, features and processes that exemplify a natural and dynamic Wadden Sea, extending from the Netherlands to Germany to Denmark. This area includes all of the Wadden Sea ecosystems, and is of sufficient size to maintain critical ecological processes and to protect key features and values. The property is subject to a comprehensive protection, management and monitoring regime which is supported by adequate human and financial resources. Human use and influences are well regulated with clear and agreed targets. Activities that are incompatible with its conservation have either been banned, or are heavily regulated and monitored to ensure they do not impact adversely on the property. As the property is surrounded by a significant population and contains human uses, the continued priority for the protection and conservation of the Wadden Sea is an important feature of the planning and regulation of use, including within land/water-use plans, the provision and regulation of coastal defences, maritime traffic and drainage. Key threats requiring ongoing attention include fisheries activities, developing and maintaining harbours, industrial facilities surrounding the

property including oil and gas rigs and wind farms, maritime traffic, residential and tourism development and impacts from climate change.

### Protection and management requirements

Maintaining the hydrological and ecological processes of the contiguous tidal flat system of the Wadden Sea is an overarching requirement for the protection and integrity of this property. Therefore conservation of marine, coastal and freshwater ecosystems through the effective management of protected areas, including marine no-take zones, is essential. The effective management of the property also needs to ensure an ecosystem approach that integrates the management of the existing protected areas with other key activities occurring in the property, including fisheries, shipping and tourism.

The Trilateral Wadden Sea Cooperation provides the overall framework and structure for integrated conservation and management of the property as a whole and coordination between all three States Parties. Comprehensive protection measures are in place within each State. Specific expectations for the long-term conservation and management of this property include maintaining and enhancing the level of financial and human resources required for the effective management of the property. Research, monitoring and assessment of the protected areas that make up the property also require adequate resources to be provided. Maintenance of consultation and participatory approaches in planning and management of the property is needed to reinforce the support and commitment from local communities and NGOs to the conservation and management of the property. The State Parties should also maintain their commitment of not allowing oil and gas exploration and exploitation within the boundaries of the property. Any development projects, such as planned wind farms in the North Sea, should be subject of rigorous Environmental Impacts Assessments to avoid any impacts to the values and integrity of the property.

### 5.2. Protective Measures

The property is mainly classified as an IUCN Category VI protected area that includes other more restrictive categories of protected areas within its boundaries. All the existing protected areas are legally established by federal or state decrees. A small part of the property (0.25%) is under private ownership. Management of private lands is regulated by existing protective measures. An essential feature of the protection of the property is that the framework of the Trilateral Wadden Sea Cooperation (The Netherlands, Germany and Denmark) provides it with one comprehensive protection and management scheme, with additional layers of protection at federal and state levels. This is also supported by a number of international designations and legal instruments such as the Ramsar Convention, several Biosphere Reserves under the UNESCO's MaB Programme, a Particularly Sensitive Sea Area (PSSA) under the International Maritime Organization (IMO), Special Protection Area (SPAs) and a Special Area of Conservation (SACs) under the EU Birds and Habitats Directives. The property is also protected under the African-Eurasian Waterbird Agreement (AEWA), which protects 235

waterbird species ecologically dependant on wetlands within the flyway.
